WHY HAVE WE GIVEN YOU THIS GUIDE?

- This guide contains information for you use when taking medicines called ACE inhibitors or ARBs and diuretics
- ACE inhibitors or ARBs and diuretics are often given together for high blood pressure and heart conditions and are usually safe
- Talk to your doctor, pharmacist (chemist) or nurse if you have any questions

THINGS YOU CAN DO TO TAKE THESE MEDICINES SAFELY

Talk to your doctor or pharmacist (chemist) if you need pain relief so that they can help you choose one
that is safe for you

ACE INHIBITORS OR ARBS, DIURETICS AND NSAIDS or COX2S CAN BE HARMFUL

Medicines called Non-steroidal anti-inflammatories (NSAIDs) eg Nurofen®, and COX2 inhibitors eg Celecoxib®, are often used for pain relief

- •ACE inhibitors or ARBs, diuretics and NSAIDs or COX2s can be harmful
- •Your doctor may recommend these medicines together but you will need regular blood test.
- •Let your doctor know if you are taking these medicines and become unwell, especially if you feel dehydrated, or have vomiting or diarrhoea
- Let your doctor or pharmacist (chemist) know immediately if you:
 - Have a skin rash or swelling of your face
 - •Feel faint or dizzy
- ► Tell your doctor or pharmacist (chemist) about <u>all</u> of the medicines you are taking before you buy any type of pain relief
 - ACE inhibitors or ARBs and diuretics can be harmful when taken with some other medicines including medicines you can buy from the supermarket or pharmacy
- Do not take any more doses than your doctor has asked you to
 - •high doses of these medicines can harm your kidneys, especially with older adults
